






Young Adult Gathering Saturday Feb. 11th @ 4:30 PM At Broad Street UMC

The projected costs for the week-long mission trip is \$1,700. The mission network will be hosting fund-raisers to help those who might be interested in this mission—service project.

A Call to Over Invest in our Youth & Children

In recent readings, I came across a quote from Youth & Children's church specialist, *Janie Huie*, and she says the following—"Working harder at what we have always done will not engage vast groups of unaffiliated millennials. We need to think differently about how we engage younger people in the church." Basically the point that Ms. Huie is making is that we are constantly finding ourselves trying to fix the broken pipeline of our youth or children by recreating patterns that served us well thirty or even forty years ago. These ideas no longer work the way they used to.

Working harder at what we have always done will not engage vast groups of unavailable millennials because that pipeline is a closed system. We need to think differently about how we engage younger people in the church. She goes on to say that we must overinvest in the young. Meaning that we must connect deeply with the community and engage people who live in the community. It means taking significant risks to innovate fresh expressions of ministry that will engage younger people. It requires offering ancient worship in fresh new ways. It means moving younger people into leadership even though they are not experienced. It means investing money into youth and children's ministries.

What ways can you over invest in our community youth and children? One step, that does not involve money is by volunteering when our Youth & Children's director needs volunteers for ministry activities. Second, you can give financially. Last, always be in prayer for our youth and children's directors. Pray for our youth and children by name. You will start noticing a change within these areas of ministry when you cover and bathe the leaders, children, and activities in prayer. Thank you to our directors for their work.

Ways to Take the Church into the Troutman Community

What would it look like if Troutman First United Methodist started doing things a little different? Could we make a difference within the Troutman Community? Here are some interesting items to ponder.

Embrace an expansive concept of Community

- 1. Learn to regard our community as an extension of our congregation. A church's mission field goes beyond its membership to include all the people God has called us to serve. We are connected to individuals who will never set foot in our building.
- 2. Know that what is happening in our church (ministry, preaching, worship, music, and Bible Study), are no longer enough to attract people in an age when church attendance is no longer a cultural expectation.
- 3. Don't sit in our church building waiting for people to come. Be prepared to meet people where they are.


Prepare ourselves Spiritually

- 1. Acknowledge the synergy between the Great Commandment Matthew 22 (love your neighbor as yourself), and the Great Commission (go and make disciples). Evangelistic outreach expresses love to others.
- 2. Remember Jesus primarily engaged others through everyday encounters, rather than in the Temple or synagogues. He fed people, met their everyday needs, and enjoyed the fellowship of others.
- 3. Express love and compassion for your community in big and small ways. Avoid judgmentalism.
- 4. Pray regularly for your neighbors and lift up community concerns.
- 5. Attend to the faith formation of existing members. Willingness to share faith and reach out to others develops as one grows in faith and discipleship.
- 6. Prepare spiritually for the transformation that creative, risk-taking outreach will bring.

Hymn Writer Biography—Featured this Month (Ms. Fanny Crosby)

2 Timothy 1:12—"Nevertheless, I am not ashamed, for I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep what I have committed to Him until that Day."

Fanny Crosby lived in the Manhattan slums and worked in rescue missions. She was close friends with Ms. Phoebe Knapp (who lavishly lived in a Brooklyn neighborhood). Ms. Knapp played for Fanny a new composition of her own. While the blind hymnist listened. Fanny immediately clasped her hands and exclaimed, "why, that says, "Blessed Assurance!" She quickly composed the words, and thus the great hymn of the church was born.

At age sixty, she began working in the downtown rescue missions, spending several days a week in lower Manhattan, witnessing to the down and out. Despite her fame as a hymn writer, she chose to live in near poverty in the New York Ghettos, for she felt a calling to minister to the needy. Just a few blocks from her little tenant apartment were the Bowery, a haunt for alcoholics and where every kind of vice flourished. There Fanny would go day after day and later would write "Rescue the Perishing."

Even in her blindness, she realized this was part of His (God's) plan. When Fanny was about six-weeks-old, her parents realized with alarm that something was wrong with her eyes. The local doctor was away but the Crosby's found a man – no one afterwards recalled his name – who claimed to be a physician. He put a hot poultice on the baby's inflamed eyes, it was supposed to draw out the infection. The infection did not clear up; however, white scars appeared. In the months that followed, the baby registered responses to objects held before her. As it turned out, Fanny was not totally blind. Even in old age, she could discern day from night. But her main vision was gone. From this accident in her childhood, she would write the hymn, "All the Way My Savior Leads Me."

Yet this stimulated other gifts, such as her phenomenal memory. As a child, Fanny memorized whole sections of the Bible including most of the Pentateuch (Genesis – Deuteronomy), the four Gospels, all of Proverbs, most of the Psalms, and vast portions of other books. Whenever, she wanted to read a passage, she just turned there in the mental "Bible" and read it verbatim. "This Holy Book," she said, when eighty-five, has nurtured my entire life."

Years later, Fanny viewed her blindness as a special gift from God. She believed He had given her a particular "soul vision" which equipped her for a special work. "It was the best thing that could have happened to me," she declared. "How in the world could I have lived such a helpful life had I not been blind?" Fanny Crosby was 95 years old when she passed. She wrote over 8,000 hymns, and was blind at the age of (6) and spent her life working for God's kingdom by ministering to the lost and dying.
