"Throw off everything that hinders us and the sin that so easily entangles us." (Hebrews 12:1)

Every day that we wake up, we have a chance to renew our minds in Christ. When we take the time to renew our mind, this allows Him to take all that hinders us so we can run *"the race marked for us."* There are things that hinder us and trip us up, slows us down as we run the race. <u>Giving it to</u> <u>God</u> may seem scary to us at first, but our surrender will bring us freedom.

Runners preparing for a race or marathon, know that to run with perseverance they have to let go of everything. Some will even shave their hair on their entire body because a slick clean surface makes all the difference with wind resistance. Every day we must choose to let go of what is behind us, so we have a smooth surface surrendered to God. When we let go, we give God a clean slate to do His mighty work in our lives.

What does it mean then to <u>Let Go and Let</u> <u>God</u>? When we let go and let God, we are submitting fully to Him. We are letting go of whatever we've been trying to do on our own so God can do what only He can do. Surrendering to God is literally giving up. It is telling God that we are not big enough to deal with our worries and that He must take over. For the first several weeks of Lent, we will be looking at areas of our lives that we need to let go and let God have complete control. Giving it to God simply means to put your complete faith in God to work things out for your good and to know that ultimately, it is His will and not your own, that determines the outcome.

Here are five quick ways to start each day giving complete control to God.

- 1. Start each day by giving it to God—start with a clean slate. Do not take yesterday's mistakes into a new day. Mentally shave off every single worry, doubt, fear, mistake and anxiety.
- 2. Start each day with prayer—speak to God. The day is full of responsibilities, but first talk to God. Acknowledge Him, tell Him that you love Him. Invite God's Spirit to guide you today. Before talking to anyone, talk to God, He will set your day on the right path.
- 3. Start each day with Scripture—open your Bible and read where you left off from previous day. The Bible is living and active and like cool water for your thirsty soul.



Ways to A Small to Mid-Size Church can Serve the Community

How could they engage the Troutman community in any significant way? With the right approach, it is possible for a small group of people to make a big impact. It will take focus and clarity about what we are trying to accomplish, but the small church can make a big impact in the world through partnerships, creative use of resources, and a focus on relational ministry. Small congregations have unique strengths that can result in strong and effective community outreach ministry.

Focus. A small congregation has to be more disciplined about not "biting off more than it can chew." Identifying just one thing to focus on (tutor kids at the local public school, collect diapers, sponsor a community garden) may well help you be more successful, as you will have clear outcomes in front of you. Internal ministry programs may have many bells and whistles, so we think we need to do that with work in our community as well — right? Wrong! Sometimes simpler is just what the community needs.


Relationships. Another advantage of being small is that your church may be better at relational ministry than larger churches, and it is the relationships that you can build with people in your community that will make the greatest impact. People who are drawn to attend smaller churches are often there because of the "family" feel; in your small congregation, you can really get to know each other, go deep in your relationships, and bear one another's burdens. Carrying that affinity for relationship into the community may well help you make a greater impact than if you brought hundreds of volunteers or thousands of dollars. Everything you've learned within your own congregation about really listening to one another and devoting time to relationships will bless your community in myriad ways.

Partnerships. Small churches often have no choice but to partner with others to carry out ministry. Partnerships, if done well, can result in exponentially greater impact. You aren't limited to the gifts within your own church. You can seek others, particularly when working on complex community issues where expertise, connections, and resources are needed. A small group of people who are willing can make a big difference!

Ownership. In a small church, members may also feel a greater sense of ownership for the ministry. Without many paid staff, it is up to church members to develop the vision and the plan, find partners, and enlist other members to get involved. You can't just look around and say, "Pastor So-and-So is going to do that." In a small church, when you look around, you might only see yourself and a few of your friends. If you don't do it, no one else will! This strong ownership by lay leaders can help ministry be sustainable over the long term.

Accountability. Finally, those in small churches may be better able to hold each other accountable for following through on ministry goals and commitments because you are small. If just a few of you are working on a project and two of you don't show up, it's pretty obvious who isn't holding up their end of the work! It is harder to be anonymous and go back on what you've agreed to. It is harder to give up when your friends are on your case!

Small churches are all too aware of the challenges facing their ministries — limited funds, members, and facilities. But even in the face of such challenges, your small church can start some very powerful community ministries. Take stock of what you *do* have rather than what you don't have, and build on those assets. Be creative about finding partners, raising money, and securing in-kind donations. And most importantly, keep going. Some of the most successful community ministries are small and focused and don't require lots of money and people. Hymn Writer Horatio Spafford-author of "It Is Well With My Soul"

2 Timothy 1:12—"Nevertheless, I am not ashamed, for I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep what I have committed to Him until that Day."

Horatio Gates Spafford was born in New York, on 20th October 1828, but it was in Chicago that he became well-known for his clear Christian testimony. He and his wife Anna were active in their church, and their home was always open to visitors. They counted the world-famous evangelist, Dwight L. Moody, among their friends. They were blest with five children and considerable wealth. Horatio was a lawyer and owned a great deal of property in his home city.

Not unlike Job in the Old Testament of the Bible, tragedy came in great measure to this happy home. When four years old, their son, Horatio Jnr, died suddenly of scarlet fever. Then only a year later, in October 1871, a massive fire swept through downtown Chicago, devastating the city, including many properties owned by Horatio. That day, almost 300 people lost their lives, and around 100,000 were made homeless. Despite their own substantial financial loss, the Spafford's sought to demonstrate the love of Christ, by assisting those who were grief-stricken and in great need. Two years later, in 1873, Spafford decided his family should take a holiday in England, knowing that his friend, the evangelist D. L. Moody, would be preaching there in the autumn. Horatio was delayed because of business, so he sent his family ahead: his wife and their four remaining children, all daughters, 11 year old Anna, 9 year old Margaret Lee, 5 year old Elizabeth, and 2 year old Tanetta.

On 22nd November 1873, while crossing the Atlantic on the steamship, Ville du Havre, their vessel was struck by an iron sailing ship. Two hundred and twenty-six people lost their lives, as the Ville du Havre sank within only twelve minutes. All four of Horatio Spafford's daughters perished, but remarkably Anna Spafford survived the tragedy. Those rescued, including Anna, who was found unconscious, floating on a plank of wood, subsequently arrived in Cardiff, South Wales. Upon arrival there, Anna immediately sent a telegram to her husband, which included the words "Saved alone...."

Receiving Anna's message, he set off at once to be reunited with his wife. One particular day, during the voyage, the captain summoned him to the bridge of the vessel. Pointing to his charts, he explained that they were then passing over the very spot where the Ville du Havre had sunk, and where his daughters had died. It is said that Spafford returned to his cabin and wrote the hymn "It is well with my soul" there and then, the first line of which is, "When peace like a river, attendeth my way.." There are other accounts that say that it was written at a later date, but obviously, the voyage was one of deep suffering and is the clear inspiration of the moving and well-loved hymn. Horatio's faith in God never faltered. He later wrote to Anna's half-sister, "On Thursday last, we passed over the spot where she went down, in mid-ocean, the waters three miles deep. But I do not think of our dear ones there. They are safe..... dear lambs".

After Anna was rescued, Pastor Nathaniel Weiss, one of the ministers traveling with the surviving group, remembered hearing Anna say, "God gave me four daughters. Now they have been taken from me. Someday I will understand why. Naturally, Anna was utterly devastated, but she testified that in her grief and despair, she had been conscious of a soft voice speaking to her, "You were saved for a purpose!" She remembered something

a friend had once said, "It's easy to be grateful and good when you have so much, but take care that you are not a fair-weather friend to God." Following this deep tragedy, Anna gave birth to three more children, but she and Horatio were not spared even more sadness, as on February 11th, 1880, their only son, Horatio (named after the brother who had died, and also after his father), he also died at the age of four. What a wonderful hymn of faith that was compiled out of such deep grief!
